AIMS AND OBJECTIVES **AIMS**

The Boughton PPG is a group of patients who have been invited to work with the practice to help patients become responsible for their own health and provide practical support, advice and input. We work closely with the doctors, nurses, dispensers, receptionists and everyone working for you at Boughton Surgery, on behalf of you, the patients that use Boughton Surgery when you're sick, stressed, injured or fed up.

Our aim is to work with the practice to provide practical support, to help patients be more involved in their own health treatments and conditions and to provide input and advice to both the practice and the patients.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Boughton PPG are to:

- give practice staff and patients the opportunity to discuss topics of mutual interest
- provide means for patients to make positive suggestions about the practice.
- encourage health education activities within the practice.
- develop self-help projects to meet the needs of fellow patients e.g. befriending, help with transport and bereavement support.
- act as a representative group that can be

called upon to influence the local provision of health and social care.

- Monitor services, e.g. hospital discharge and support when back in the community. To provide a focal point of patients who have grumbles or complaints about the practice by providing the practice's viewpoint.
- To provide advice on procedures that can ease difficulties in times of stress or illness

ORGANISATION

The Boughton PPG comprises a Chairman and representatives of the major villages served by the practice together with the Practise Manager and members of staff. We meet quarterly in Boughton Surgery or more often if required.

Following recent departures, the Boughton PPG is currently represented by patients Boughton, Brookeville (embracing from Feltwell and adjacent villages), Fincham, Northwold and Stoke Ferry. We would like to encourage patients of Boughton surgery who reside in Gooderstone, Whittington, Wretton, and West Dereham to join us to make a more representative group serving the whole practice. on Plough Monday to perform their 2012 Mummer's Play. Before they could start a small group of



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year 5 and 6 children treated them and the rest of the school to a performance of their Mummer's Play. It was a wonderful way to join in the life of the village if somewhat strange and bemusing for the audience. I hope to see this as a regular part of our January calendar.

We also heard good news that four of our children, Tallulah Stocking, Charlie Cater, Eboni McGurk and Daisy Sutton, have successfully qualified to participate in the County Cross Country Finals. Congratulations to them and we wish them every success in their races.

Those of you who have passed the school recently will have observed builders working on the site. At the end of last term we were delighted to get news that planning permission had been granted for a new modular classroom to be built. We have been very fortunate in these days of tightening belts to have been supported in developing the school with funding for the Ely Diocese, which is earmarked purely for developing school buildings. The PTFA have also kindly committed to raise the £9600 costs towards the build, which the school has to pay. I am very grateful to them and think it is exciting to have a target to work towards. As the diocese funding is time limited the project will be finished by the end of February 2012. During half term the classroom will arrive and be installed by crane, this should be quite an exciting spectacle to observe. This is an exciting opportunity for the school and will enable us to create other teaching and learning spaces within the school.

During January, Hannah Bradford organised a Pyjama Day at school to raise funds towards the Sports and Social Club. The children and staff arrived in their pyjamas, made their contributions and continued as normal. The visitors we had that day were a little bemused when they first arrived! We raised just over £90, which will be passed onto the Sports and Social Club. I am very proud of our children who are keen to support others when they identify a need. Thank you to the parents for their support.

The Norfolk entertainer, Olly Day came to the school and performed a fabulous magic show, which focussed on road safety. The children and staff thoroughly enjoyed the show but also came away with important learning about 'Stop, Look and Listen' and 'Be Bright at Night', crucial safety messages for our children to understand particularly on our dark rural roads.

Our new term brought new projects for the children to learn through. The Year 6 (New York Class) children are focussing on 'Water' and will be looking at the subject from a variety of angles. Years 4 and 5 (Madrid Class) will be learning about 'Cities'. Years 2 and 3 (London Class) will be learning about the city they are named after: 'London'. As usual the younger children in Rio Class will be working through a variety of topics during the term in their creative and fluid way starting with 'Animals'. RIVER WATCH

Never talk to an adult or superior while eating or drinking" etc. He never prepared me for the above scenario. Would it have been more polite to accept? Answers on a postcard, please.

Management and I have just spent another couple of weeks in our humble timeshare in India. As always, I took the local newspaper daily (The Navhindt Times at 3 rupees, about 5p) as I really enjoy the colourful language and hyperbole employed by the writers. I would like to share a few with you – they are reproduced verbatim!

Boy declared dead wakes up in mortuary – doctor suspended The Uttar Pradesh government on Monday suspended Dr.... in a case of medical negligence in which a 17 year old Rodney, declared dead by him, had

woken up in the Muzaffarnagar mortuary ten hour later, just as the were starting the postmortem examination.

Cruise boat hits a pillar of Mandovi Bridge "Shantadurga", a cruise boat, suffered engine failure and hit the middle pillar of the bridge, giving anxious moments to the 68 young tourists and crew members on board. The staff at the nearby jetty could not do anything for lack of equipment and the Captain of Ports too was hamstrung as it has an old tug that is in a state of total disrepair and not seaworthy. A sister cruise boat. "The Santa Monica" was then drafted into service but could not tow the "Shantadurga" against the current. Finally, friendly trawlers came to the aid of the terrified tourists and towed it to a jetty. Eye witnesses pointed out that this is an extremely crowded river and it was criminal that the authorities have no equipment to deal with emergencies of any nature, including terror attack.

Chhattisgarh village in shock after 51 get life sentence A day after 51 villagers from the village of Nevari-Fulwari were sentenced to life imprisonment in a murder case, stunned locals said life had come to a virtual standstill. There are 80 families in the village. In 2008, an argument had turned nasty and the villagers had set fire to the village sarpanch (Note: for days, I thought the sarpanch was the village hall - it turned out to be their equivalent of the mayor) aged 45yr. 79 people were named in the case and 51 have been jailed for life. One of the convicts' wives said "Life has become hell for everyone. The only option we now have is to commit mass suicide because almost one person from each family has been given imprisonment". Raju Sahu, who owns a small pangutka shop, becomes teary-eyed when asked to comment about the court judgement.

Train runs over youth in Vasco The body of an unidentified youth, who allegedly committed suicide by sleeping on the railway track, was found in two pieces on Saturday afternoon. The youth is thin with a wheatish complexion. Police had hoped to identify him from his cell phone but it was broken into pieces.

Suicide bid by Nigerian in Mapula lockup foiled An alert jail sentry was shocked to find the Nigerian attempting to hang himself with the help of his T shirt. The suicide bid was foiled and the accused was re-arrested and charged for attempting to commit suicide. More next month.

I still go to the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital Medical School to examine the medical students. These are serious affairs, speaking is in hushed tones and the General Medical Council invigilator wanders around listening behind the screens to the examiners and students. As you can imagine, it is pretty stressful for all concerned. Last week I was in one corner of a room with another examiner using the other corner of the room. We both suddenly had a 10 minute gap between students and, as you do, we wandered around the room looking at the anatomical models. I pulled back a sheet to reveal an enormous pair of hard plastic unisex buttocks, in the

middle of which was a soft insert representing the "back bottom hole" as they say in children's books. Inside the buttocks, there was a circular threaded area into which could be screwed plastic inserts which, to the examining finger doing the rectal examination, would represent enlarged prostate, fibroid uterus and goodness knows what else! Next to the buttocks sat a box of rubber gloves and some lubricant. The other examiner and I looked at each other, he screwed in an enlarged prostate, I did the rectal examination, not bothering with gloves or lubricant after all, it was only plastic - and got my fingers stuck. It must have been a sight; he was unscrewing the prostate and I was encouraging him is a slightly frenzied fashion. Happily, the GMC invigilator did not appear and, eventually, I got free and, like a couple of sheepish schoolboys, we retired to our corners. Ah well!

3. The minutes of the meeting held on 01/11/11 were agreed as a true record.

4. Matters Arising from previous meetings

- The Parish Council allotments both have tenants and the Clerk will clarify which tenant is cultivating which plot.
- It was noted that discos are being successfully held at Northwold Sports & Social Club.
- Thanks were expressed to Mr Roger Warner who has rolled the ground at Northwold Playing Field.
- Ivy has been removed from the bus shelter at Whittington but there is still more to be cleared.
- A drain has been repaired in School Lane.
- Mrs R Crisp and Mr A Collins volunteered to decorate the Parish Council Christmas Tree in the Church.

5. Reports

- 5.1 Chairman's Report
- Mrs Sue Leet who was formerly a member of the Parish Council but resigned due to personal reasons was present at the meeting and has volun-

- teered to re-join the Council. There are two vacancies on the Council and the Monitoring Officer will be consulted regarding whether the Council can co-opt members at the January meeting of the Parish Council.
- The Village Allotment Charity has asked if water can be made available at Northwold Cemetery for use by allotment holders. It has been suggested a water trough could be placed in the Cemetery which the Charity Trustees would be responsible for. The allotment rent would be increased and money raised would be used for paying for the water used. Costs for providing water will be brought to the January Parish Council meeting for further consideration.

5.2 The Clerk's Report

- A letter has been received from St. Andrew's Church, Northwold requesting financial assistance towards grounds maintenance of the Churchyard. This will be an agenda item for the January meeting of the Parish Council.
- A letter has been received from The Stoke Ferry Common Room Youth Club requesting help to purchase a shed and equipment. This will be an agenda item for the January meeting of the Parish Council
- A quote has been received to fit replacement seats and chains on swings at the Playing Field. It was previously agreed this would be undertaken and the cost quoted is £368.00 plus VAT.
- The Clerk attended the Norfolk Association of Local Councils Autumn Seminar held at Sandringham on November 15th. Speakers gave presentations on celebrations for the Queens Diamond Jubilee, the Queen Elizabeth II Fields Challenge (the aim is to protect 2012 outdoor recreation spaces across the country by 2012), Road Closures for events. Advice was given regarding governance, auditing and risk assessment and information was also provided regard-

ing Civil Parking Enforcement.


- Previously on-street parking offences have been criminal offences discretionally enforced by the Police and progressed through the Magistrates Courts with any income going to the Treasury. On-street parking has now become a civil offence and can be enforced by the Local Authorities under Delegated Powers. Income will go to support the operation of the scheme and related transport projects. Local Authorities will be dealing with off street Local Authority car parks, yellow lines, on-street parking, residents parking and on-street pay and display. 6. Whittington Cemetery

Northwold Parish Council is proceeding to seek planning permission for change of use of part of Whittington Playing Field to use as a cemetery. The change of use would mean loss of part of a playing field which is against policy in the emerging Local Development Framework therefore, Chris Parsons, who has been engaged to act as the agent for the Parish Council to submit the necessary planning application, is to meet a representative of Sports England at Whittington Playing Field to gauge the extent of the implications for the future of the Playing Field before an application is filed. The Environment Agency will also be consulted before any application is made. Some discussion took place regarding what it may









cost to establish a new cemetery at Whittington. It is hoped volunteers will contribute to keep costs down. Matters such as the track to the Playing Field at Whittington and hedging/fencing of the cemetery area will need future discussion and consideration will need to be made as to how the project will be financed. The Parish Council has endeavoured to maintain some reserve money and decisions will need to be made as to how this money should be allocated.

7. Agreement with Northwold Sports & Social Club for hire of the Club building

The Parish Council has once again requested that a new agreement with the Sports & Social Club should be signed and a further letter will be sent to the Sports & Social Club requesting an update on the present situation. It was felt the Club should be congratulated for the efforts so far made to keep the Club open.



Feltwell Surgery Patient Participation Group

Nurse Specialist - Beverly Darge

Feltwell Surgery's Nurse Specialist is Bev-

erly Darge. What is a Nurse Specialist? Well – it's what it says on the tin – a nurse who has specialised in a specific area.



It would possibly be easier to ask what Beverly has NOT specialised in. She started off in 1969/70 by getting an Ophthalmic Nurses Diploma at the Ophthalmic and Aural Hospital in Maidstone, Kent. She qualified as a Registered General Nurse in 1988 at the Medway Hospital then as a Midwife in 1990 at All Saints Hospital - both in Kent.

In 1994 Beverly became a Practice Nurse. This is as qualified nurse who has undertaken further training. They work in -a GP's surgery as part of a healthcare team, which can include doctors, health visitors and pharmacists.

Their job involves treating minor injuries, helping deal with minor illnesses and chronic disease monitoring, assisting with minor operations done under local anesthetic, family planning advice, running vaccination programmes – for example, flu jabs or baby immunisations, giving B12 injections and running Warfarin clinics – as well as taking charge of various health programmes like help giving up smoking.

Since becoming a Practice Nurse Beverly has completed numerous courses and diplomas, 'In order,' she says, 'to give the care I need to give within my role'. These include a Diploma in Asthma care; a Marie Curie breast and pelvic examination course; a Family planning certificate; and a Diploma in Diabetes Care in General Practice as well as spending time on study days to keep her knowledge base up to date.

'As a Nurse Specialist I specialise in Diabetes Care. I feel I compliment the doctors as I can deal with the day-to-day diagnosis and treatment of diabetes. I need their help if I notice the condition gets more complicated,

or there are other medical conditions alongside diabetes.

My role is not equal to a doctor. My training is completely different. The initial training for a nurse is 3 years and for a doctor is 5 years. Doctors will also specialise as well as nurses but they have a much wider general knowledge of conditions that can affect the body. Nurses work at a different level with the 'hands on' ongoing care of those conditions

When we see patients there are several ways we can deal with the situation in front of us. We can examine and prescribe treatment for that patient. We can give the patient treatment that they can start while they wait to see the doctor. We can go to the doctor for advice. Ask the doctor to come into our consultation or add the patient to the end of the doctor's present clinic. It all depends on what we are seeing and how urgent we feel the condition is.'

So we can regard ourselves as extremely fortunate to have such a dedicated Nurse Specialist as Beverly Darge at Feltwell Surgery.

Profile 2 Triage Receptionists

Triage is a fairly new word to us. It's the initial assessment of a situation. In surgeries it is now common for receptionists to undertake triage at a very basic level in order to save time and ensure the patient is seen by the right clinician as quickly as possible.

At Feltwell Surgery we have two reception-





ists, Rebecca Palfrey and Grace Allen, who have been trained in triage. They receive constant in-house training from the Nurse Manager and the GP's to keep them up to date.

Many patients are not fully aware of this training. The questions asked of a patient by a triage-trained receptionist are not intended to invade privacy or to diagnose. They are designed to ensure each patient is seen as

efficiently as possible by the appropriate clinician (doctor, nurse specialist, nurse etc). If, however, you don't wish to discuss something with the receptionist then you only have to say so. You will still be seen. Triage is a way of saving time so that you see the most suitable clinician.

One of the main needs for triage is to make sure urgent cases get directed to the right specialist and this requires some basic questions. It's a bit like going to the Supermarket and either spending a lot of time looking for what you want or going to the information desk to ask where it is kept and then going straight there. It saves time.

Patient privacy is paramount at all times. You may occasionally overhear an exchange of information about a patient but whenever possible patients will be referred to by their NHS number If a patient wants to talk more privately to the receptionist when phoning or visiting the surgery a separate room may be used to ensure greater privacy. You only have to ask.

The NHS is changing and we all have to evolve with it. Each surgery has a complex clinical team who specialise in various areas. The role of the Health Care Assistants, such as the triage receptionist, is to help support the nursing team more so that they in turn can support the doctors more. This ultimately frees up more GP time for complex conditions.

If the triage receptionist is in any doubt about how to prioritise a patient they can call on a full clinical team. They have various protocols and guidelines to follow to make sure that a patient's care is never compromised. In fact quite a few patients have phoned to make a routine appointment with a GP and after a few basic triage questions, the reception team have identified the need for an urgent assessment and booked an urgent appointment accordingly.

So – to reiterate – there is a need for patients to be triaged in order for them to get the quickest and most appropriate attention. However, if you do not want to be triaged - it's up to you. Triage receptionists are there to help – not interfere.
