being incredibly well dressed and looking the part. Queen Hannah and King Joshua led our procession with a regal grace and






their subjects followed with a few enthusiastic skips here and there. The dancing was lovely and well rehearsed, all the children per-

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WHAT DOES THE DOCTOR THINK THIS MONTH?

The Ship's Doctor: Deannie and I spent the first 2 weeks of April rocking and bouncing around the Bay of Biscay and the Western Mediterranean. We joined the ship at Southampton and sailed at about 5.30pm. We had spent all day familiarising ourselves with the vessel and I was taking my first evening surgery when, at 6.30pm, in the restaurant, an 85 year old man vomited copiously and collapsed unconscious into his soup. I shot up there and, with help, recovered him to my hospital in the bows, where there is a doctor's room, an examination room, an Intensive Care Unit and two 4-bedded wards, all for me and a nursing sister to look after! Deannie and I had a cabin in the bows; it had formerly been a hospital ward, was painted brilliant white and was enormous. The patient recovered consciousness after half an hour, with the aid of an intravenous infusion, but, because the diagnosis was in doubt (all my tests had been negative) we decided to evacuate him by helicopter to hospital on land (We were only an hour out of Southampton). There followed an amazing episode. Imagine a ship steaming at 25mph in the pitch black, a helicopter flying parallel to the ship, lights blazing, rotors screaming, a fantastic downdraught and plenty of adrenaline. The helicopter hovered over the ship, lowered its cable, the patient (with helicopter paramedic) was attached and the helicopter swung sideways, suspending the patient and

the paramedic over the sea. After what seemed like minutes, the helicopter suddenly dropped about 30 feet, the winch was operated and the patient and paramedic disappeared into the body of the helicopter. Amazing flying skills! The man had been travelling as the carer to an 87 year old lady with osteoporosis. We could not get her off and she had to travel with us for 4 days until we had passed the Bay of Biscay and could put her ashore in Portugal to fly home. She really blossomed during those few days, was often seen about the ship in better and better makeup and was thoroughly fed-up to have to leave the ship, declaring that she would return soon for a cruise on her own as everyone had been so kind to her.

Four days later, we had an episode which was quite frightening for me, hundreds of miles from land and any help. A two year old boy had suffered an ear infection and had been vomiting to the point where he had become very floppy through dehydration. At home, I would have admitted him to hospital for rehydration but that was not an option so we set up a Dextrose/Saline drip and, within 24 hours, he was rushing around the ship, quite a celebrity.

Later, we had a similar episode with an 85 year old lady a couple of days before we docked. She developed pneumonia and dehydration and spent a couple of days in our hospital before being offloaded into an ambulance when we arrived back in Southampton. I was not allowed to leave the ship until

all the passengers had disembarked – just as well because a man was found dead in his cabin during my 6.45am breakfast. I rushed up there, put out a Code Alpha which caused all sorts of crewmen and the nurse to arrive with a defibrillator, oxygen, drip sets, Adrenaline, etc., and actually managed to resuscitate the passenger. As we were docked in Southampton at the time, we could use shore facilities so we called an ambulance. To my amazement, the ambulance crew were with us within 5 minutes. I later discovered that they had attended to take the 85 year old lady to hospital and had only just loaded her into the vehicle when we called. In the event, she was turfed out of the vehicle which was then used to take the resuscitated patient to hospital while we found somewhere warm to keep the old lady pending her transfer to hospital.

The job was quite busy -2 surgeries a day plus cabin visits and night visits, senior officers' daily meeting, various cocktail parties where the captain and officers had to greet all the passengers, food-handler inspections, 140 at a time, infection control meetings, and so on, all with the ship dancing around like a flea in a fit. I had three uniforms - navy blue with sleeve rings, cream with epaulettes and formal, which was a cutaway cream formal jacket with epaulettes, worn with black dinner jacket trousers. Needless to say, Deannie more than kept up, with some lovely evening dresses for the formal occasions. She enjoyed herself, filling her time with yoga, keep-fit, deck-walking, lectures, Bridge les-





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sons, Spa treatments, reading and so on.

All in all, a great success, good to have a bit of a career boost at my age, and we shall be travelling with them to Norway in July.

Marks & Spencer and their tights: In our day, the girls wore stockings and, in a new relationship, the length of time taken to reach the stocking top was measured in weeks. Changes to the Ambulance Services The right treatment at the right place at the right time.

The Clinical Operations Manager of the East of England Ambulance NHS Trust (EEAST), Carl Smith, talked to Feltwell and Boughton PPG's about the work EEAST does and the services they offer.

EEAST covers an area of 7,500 square miles and serves 5.8 million people. There are 276 double-crewed ambulances, 235 Rapid Response vehicles, 4 helicopters, 100 marked officer response cars, 32 High Dependency Units and 5 Cycle response units. There is a staff of 4,000 with 2,000 volunteers. Last year they dealt with 720,000 emergency calls.

This number is rising. Why? Things have changed. Doctors work differently now and patients have different expectations.

GP's used to be available 24/7. They worked locally. OUR doctor knew OUR personal history and medication. They could also tell time wasters from urgent cases. The doctors would call for an ambulance only if it was necessary.

In 2007 a government initiative changed doctor's working hours. They could no longer be available 24/7. Larger group practices were formed to share the workload during the day and 'on call' out of surgery hours services were established.

Consequently, if a patient couldn't get the doctor they knew, they rang 999. Those calls were treated in a first come first served order. The first caller with a bad sore throat would get treated before the second that might be for a child who'd stopped breathing. 999 calls increased by 10% each year.

However, there are no more ambulances than 15 years ago. Furthermore on top of the increased demand EEAST has to save £50 million in the next three years.

Taking healthcare to the patient is a new way of approaching things. This is in place now and means patients get the right treatment in the right place at the right time. Clinical Support Desks (CSD) are the first point of contact. These are manned by medically trained people.

So what happens today when we call 999?

- You will be asked basic questions to find out if the situation is life threatening (about a third are). The closest service is sent immediately.
- If the situation is not life threatening, the CSD decide on the next best course of action. This may involve advice over

the phone, an ambulance, a GP, district nurse, dentist or a visit to a walk in centre.

Further initiatives will soon be in place to clarify the situation for the public. For instance:

Call 999 for life threatening emergencies Call 111 for non –emergency health related problems

Call 101 for non-emergency police related problems

In March this year 6,700 emergency calls resulted in 3,352 ambulances sent out. The other 3,348 were treated by other means. Consequently ambulances, with their highly trained staff, remained available for serious emergencies. This means less crowded and more efficient hospitals AND for those in dire need more probability of an ambulance arriving within the government target of 8 minutes.

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MINUTES OF NORTHWOLD PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS HELD AT THE VILLAGE HALL

ON APRIL 3RD 2012

- **1. <u>Apologies for absence:</u>** Mrs S Bury
- 2. No Declarations of Interest made.
- 3. The minutes of the meeting held on 06/03/12 were agreed as a true record.
- 4. No matters raised from previous meetings.
- 5. Reports
- 5.1 Chairman's Report
- Following research it has been discovered that the land of Whittington Playing Field was sold to Northwold Parish Council for the sum of £40.00 on condition that the area was used for recreation. Whittington Parochial Church Council has therefore concluded that the Parish Council cannot be asked to continue to investigate use of part of Whittington Playing Field as a new Cemetery. The Parish Council has already accrued a cost of nearly £1700 to research the possibility of establishing a Cemetery in Whittington and it is felt no more money can be put towards this project at present.
- Whittington Churchyard has only two more burial spaces available and then the Churchyard will be deemed as closed. Whittington is considered to be part of the parish of Northwold and thus residents from Whittington can be buried in the Cemetery at Northwold. The current cost of burial for a resident of the parish is £80.00.

- The street sweeper visits the parish on a 20 week schedule. Northwold is due to be swept the week commencing May 21st. An operator from the Borough Council litter picks through the main route of the village every two weeks.

- CAN AGM was held on March 12th and new officers have been elected.
- Sue Bury has resigned from CAN.
- CAN is continuing to research the possibility of establishing a shop in the village.

7. <u>Agreement with Northwold Sports & Social Club for hire of the Club building</u> -

The Chairman has spoken to the Chairman of Northwold Sports & Social Club and has been told a successful meeting has been held when new officials for the Club were elected. The Club plans that the bar will be open Friday and Saturday evenings and Sunday lunch times. It is thought the Club may be given the kitchen from the Village Hall when it is replaced.

The Club has requested further discussion regarding the Agreement for hire of the Club building and thus the Committee will be asked to put matters they wish to be considered in writing and the Agreement will then be an agenda item again at the May Parish Council meeting.

The Sports & Social Club has had a financial statement compiled for the past financial year and this indicates there is money still owed to the Club by the Parish Council.

Research shows that the Parish Council entered into an agreement with the Social Club in 2001 but it is believed no money is now owing as the Sports & Social Club have paid no rent to the Parish Council since 2005. The situation will be clarified before further discussion at the May Parish Council meeting. Several matters need to be resolved regarding the Agreement with the Sports & Social Club and hopefully there will be constructive communication with the new Committee.

11. <u>Celebration of the Queen's Diamond</u> <u>Jubilee</u>

Some discussion took place regarding how the Queen's Diamond Jubilee could be marked in the parish. As the Jubilee weekend is around the same time as the annual Northwold Carnival it is unlikely anyone will organise any large celebration specifically for the Jubilee.

It was suggested the Parish Council could consider purchasing a bench or planting trees to mark the Jubilee. It is possible a pack of trees could be obtained from the Woodland Trust but locations for the trees would need to be agreed. This will be discussed further at the Annual Parish Meeting and the May Parish Council meeting.

The meeting was suspended at this point to allow a Police report to be given by PCSO Tracey Milburn.

- Number plates have been stolen in Feltwell and Hockwold and the Police are suggesting the use of tamper proof screws.
- Fuel and scrap metal thefts continue to take place locally.
- Catalytic converters are being taken from 4 x 4 vehicles.
- Although members of the public are advised to remain vigilant regarding the above no crime has been reported in Northwold recently.

12. <u>Rules and Regulations for Northwold</u> <u>Cemetery</u>

Mr. A Collins has compiled new rules and regulations for Northwold Cemetery with help from Mrs Ann Howarth who manages the daily running of the Cemetery for the Parish Council. The draft rules will be presented to Councillors for agreement at the May Parish Council Meeting.

It was agreed current fees for the Cemetery should remain and that Mrs. Howarth should be thanked for continuing to manage the Cemetery.

Matters to be considered in the draft rules include:

- For how many years should an Exclusive Right of Burial be granted?
- If burial takes place in a grave without the Exclusive Right of Burial being purchased then the grave can be re-used and no memorial should be placed on the grave
- Grave diggers should be named on a register and they should provide risk assess-

- ments for working in the Cemetery
- It was noted that Whittington residents are included as parishioners of Northwold and that the Parish Council is willing to consider individual charges for the Cemetery should residents known to be in need of financial support.

13. Further reports:

13.1 The Parish Council will consider cleaning the War Memorial and grant funding for this will be researched.

13.2 The Parish Council has £400 "Pride in Norfolk" money ring fenced for "village improvements". A suggestion was made that this could be used to purchase a seat to mark the Queen's Jubilee. It was noted an 8" x 2" engraved stainless steel plaque could be purchased for £24.00 or a brass one for £17.50.

ON APRIL 11TH 2012

4. Chairman's Report

The Chairman thanked Councillors (including new members Sue Bury and Alan Collins) and the Clerk for their support during the year. Sue Leet was welcomed back as a Councillor earlier in the year.

Grit bins have been changed in the parish and two larger dog waste bins have also now been ordered. It was noted that a problem exists with dog fouling by the Primary School.

Discussions remain ongoing with Northwold Sports & Social Club regarding the lease for the building on Northwold Playing Field which is owned by the Parish Council. The Parish Council wishes the Sports & Social Club new Committee success with its efforts to keep the Club running. It is hoped agreement can be reached with the new Committee regarding use of the Club building.

5. Parish Council Financial Report

The precept for the financial year March 31st 2011 to April 1st 2012 was £17000. The Council has under spent and money will be carried forward to the current financial year. Due to the predicted under spend the precept request remained the same for 2012/13.

Money set aside for general grounds maintenance was being held in case work was needed at Northwold Recreation Ground to deal with the problem of chafer bugs. The Council was also investigating the possibility of establishing a Cemetery at Whittington but this project has been put on hold.

There is around £7000 that will be carried forward from 2011/12 to 2012/13, and the estimated reserve funds will then stand at £14,700. The External Auditor has asked if the Parish Council was building any reserves and it is now felt sufficient reserves are being held.

With healthy reserves it was agreed at the April Parish Council meeting to purchase two large dog waste bins as those in the parish are well used. Consideration is also to be given to the purchase of seats to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

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

COMMUNITY LEARNING PROGRAMME

Hockwold and Methwold Community School

In line with a national drive for rural schools' networks, where schools become learning hubs for their community, Hockwold & Methwold Community School has extended provision to distance learning courses. Working in partnership with Loughborough College, the University of London and Anglia Ruskin University, the school offers a range of further and higher education courses

Distance learning involves a blend of on-line learning, face to face learning at 'base' (the Community Sport & Fitness Building on the school site) and occasional days at the institution.

Undoubtedly, the most attractive feature is the cost. At a time when access to university courses costs in the region of £9,000 per year, the school is able to offer the Degree courses at just £2,000 per year. The parttime nature of the course also allows the

student to continue working while studying. It may be possible to obtain a grant of up to £1,200 per year if annual parental income is less than £36,000.

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REGISTER OF ELECTORS

The Government is requiring all Electoral Registration Officers in England & Wales, except London, to publish a revised Register of Electors on 16th October this year instead of 1st December. This is in readiness for the Police & Crime Commissioner elections scheduled for 15th November. As a result, the annual electoral registration process needs to take place earlier than usual. A form and reply paid return envelope will therefore begin to be personally delivered to every property in West Norfolk from early July. Completion and return of the form is both obligatory and important because the Register is used not just for electoral purposes but also by many financial service providers dealing with, for example, mortgages, loans or new accounts. Anyone whose name is not on the Register will not only be unable to vote on November 15th and at next year's County Council elections but will also be likely to have problems using any service that involves a check of the Register.

The form is intended for the present occupiers of an address. The name of anyone aged 16 or over who is expected to be resident at the address on 15th October needs to be on the form and the names of anyone no longer at the address crossed out. The date of birth of anyone aged 16 or 17 will also be required. If any changes to your household occur after the form has been completed but on or before 15th October please contact the Helpline immediately. The number is 01553 616773.

Forms received by owners of properties that are expected to be empty on 15th October sim-

ply need the "Property empty on 15th October" box ticking and returning. This will avoid the issue of reminders.

In the event of any queries when the form arrives, householders can telephone the Helpline and any of the electoral staff will be glad to assist.

Due to the much earlier Register publication date, prompt return of the form or, better still, confirmation by freephone, internet or SMS (details on the form) would be very helpful. It will also of course avoid the need for reminders and help to keep costs down.
