



### **Parish Council Report**

There were five Councillors present, the Chairman, Steve Freemantle, Rosemary Crisp. Verity Lynch, Jim Norris and Mick Peake.plus six members of the public. The minutes of the meetings held in August were approved and we discussed the following.

A problem was being experienced with cars being parked in Normandy Close preventing residents' access to their driveways and this mostly by School traffic. It was agreed that the Acting Clerk, Mrs.Sharon Freemantle, write to the Head Teacher asking that the matter be addressed.

With regard to the ongoing problem of the Manor House a Borough Council Working Group with the Conservation Officer were to meet on 4<sup>th</sup> September and the outcome is eagerly awaited All other matters are to be monitered and will be reviewed

The Chairman had been attempting to clarify the position with reference to the removal of litter waste. It is unfortunate that the Borough Council wrote to us the Parish Council in April 2008 stating that only two bins would be emptied free of chargeand to advise of any extra that might be needed. No action was taken at the time with the result that none of the bins in the Village are being emptied. This matter is being followed up by the Chairman.

New playground equipment had been installed and it was noted that this was being used by children although no moneies, official transfer of equipment or technical inspection certificate had been passed to the PC. The Clerk will write to the Playgroup but cannot accept responsibility for the equipment until transferred. And it should not be used.

Rabbits are now a problem on the Cemetery but due to myxomatosis affecting the rabbit population this problem should be resolved naturally.

It was brought to the Councils attention that land adjacent to the River had recently been fenced off. It was agreed that the Clerk should write to the Owners requesting that they open up the land again to give access to the river which had an historical use by pedestrians and horse riders.

Concern had been expressed about litter

on the Common - some had been cleared. It was agreed that this area be reviewed in Spring 2010 for possibly another Environment Day (we hope that the clear up of the Old Cemetery this month will be successful).

The interim Accounts up to 25th August were presented. A forecast indicates that although our expenditurehas been carefully monitered the deficit of £3000 that we started this financial year with will not be reduced The Council will meet in November to discuss the precept increase necessary to put us on a level footing and how this will work out per head of population. (The big-spend that brought about this deficit was in respexct of repairs to the Old Cemetery Walls and Gates, clearance of the rubbish from the School Lane Cemetery and work on drainage and other problems at the Recreation Ground).

WNBC Planning.

Comfort Inn Change of Use. Had been referred to the Development Control Board on 7<sup>th</sup> September. Mr.Peake requested clarification of Councillors views before attending this meeting. This was: one in favour, two against and one abstention.

11 Pinfold Lane, Application for extension. Refused - referred to Development Control Board. This application had previously been approved by us.

15 Pinfold Lane. Application for extension. Approved by us. It was felt this would enhance the area.

Agricultural Building @ Methwold Road, Whittington. Support was given to this application.

The meeting was attended by Ms Melanie Stephen who gave a presentation of the aims of The Hastoe Group with regard to the erection of affordable housing within the boundaries of the Village, This will be debated more fully at a later meeting.

Currently Northwold needs a new Parish Clerk and is also advertising for nominations for Councillors. Statutory Notices have been posted. This has to be done before any co-options can be accepted by the Electoral Registration

The next meeting of the Parish Council is due to take place on Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup> October at 7.30p.m. at the Village

Possibly a Grant would be forthcoming from the WNBC A new vacuum cleaner is now needed and is to be purchased Paper towels will also replace those at present supplied in the toilets.

A draft Hiring Agreement had been prepared together with the terms and conditions for the Hiring of the Hall. These were considered and approved to come into effect

Birmingham revisited -The psychological bladder

Many of you will recall the tale of my last visit to daughter Charlotte and her husband, Oliver's, Birmingham house in January. However, whenever we visit Charlotte's house, 3.30am finds us both squirming in the bed and having to accept that a trip downstairs is essential. In common with ladies visiting a pub loo, we make a joint expedition through the house. The boards outside the bedroom creak and every stair creaks on our way downstairs. Will we wake them up? The dining room and the sitting room are negotiated in the dark and then we arrive at the kitchen door. Now, Charlotte has a cat called Holly whose main aim in life is to shoot upstairs and lie on a bed. Our aim is to reach the bathroom, the other side of the kitchen, without letting Holly escape. With some fancy footwork, the bathroom is reached without releasing Holly and, on the first night, pulling the light cord resulted in a "ping" as the lamp blew. Management, by this time desperate, decided to use the facilities in the dark while I hunted out a new lamp. A wail arose - the paper had run out. Eventually, we sorted ourselves out, celebrated with a cup of tea and returned to bed, boards creaking furiously.

However, it was spotless and we were delighted to find the accommodation. On arrival, we were given an instruction sheet. In the bedroom, we had a kettle and some tea bags and coffee sugar and milk sachets on a tray. In best seaside B&B tradition, a small card sat beside the tray: This Bed and Breakfast Guest House is happy to provide this drinks tray for your convenience. It is intended to provide you with a drink at night and again first thing in the morning. This facility must not be used for making drinks during the day. If you wish a drink during the day, additional sachets and tea bags may be purchased from reception at 4p each. They just cannot resist it, can they? Next morning, Management and I took a trip on the yellow topped tour bus –"This is your taxi for the day – get on and off as often as you like" – and had a wonderful tour. For those of you who have never been, Whitby is well worth a visit.

The next port of call was Goathland (Aidensfield of Hearbeat fame) in North Yorkshire. We were last there well before Hearbeat kicked off and it was a lovely, quiet village in the middle of nowhere. Now, there are coach parks, endless day-trippers and numerous shops and stalls selling souvenirs. We had a bite of lunch and soon moved on, but not before purchasing a slate notice for our kitchen at home:

"The views of the man of the house are not necessarily those of the management". Neither of us could resist it!

### Riverwatch

Our weather is in turmoil. Days are a lottery between summer and winter. We have alternate days of brilliant sunshine and heat followed by high winds and torrential rain. We assume autumn is patiently waiting but our fur and feather friends must be rather confused. For them the months of the year dictate their direction and the all important clock needs winding up!

This afternoon favours the sun again and it is burning. Its reflection sparkles across the the river making a glittering silver pathway. The only shadow is under the far away trees and looks dark and inviting. Swifts still circle and dive endlessly chasing the flies although time dictates they should now be gathering for their homeward journey and that the water-born flies be spent.

The river is flat and black. There is no sign of flow but for sure it is there and unstoppable. Silver and red roach occupy the margins in numbers yet until a few days ago were unseen. Suddenly my float disappears and the first big bream is on its way. At least one theory is working but sadly only a few minutes are left. I will stay until I can see no more and be thankful for yet another enjoyable day alongside the dear old river Wissey.
