NORTHWOLD WI

Two members of Northwold WI visited the Snettisham Craft Day on 24th June where there was a selection of various crafts such as Beaded Tassels to Lavender Cushions for members to attempt. A delicious lunch was served and everyone had a chance to socialise with other WI ladies from across the county.

On Wednesday 30th June Northwold WI organised a coach trip to the Royal Norfolk Show. The weather was superb and a good day was enjoyed by everyone. One member, who was exhibiting her Highland Cattle at the two-day event, was very pleased as she came away with many rosettes.

Our usual monthly meeting took place on Tuesday 13th July where the guest speaker was Mr Rex Makinson who trains and works with PAT Dogs. These dogs are part of a scheme whereby pets are used as therapy for people in hospitals, old peoples' homes and prisons. The animals used are very placid and gentle and not all pets are suitable for this work. Mr Makinson introduced us to the two dogs who accompanied him – Misty and Charlie – and these dogs were a great hit with the ladies of the WI. After a short film showing us the work of the PAT scheme Mr Makinson told us more about the work of the scheme such as how the animals can help children who have animal phobias or other problems. The children will trust the animals whilst they may not trust an adult. The animals do not judge or criticise but are just there to be hugged or stroked or talked to.

Cats can also be used as therapy animals and at present there are 92 cats and 3000 dogs being used in the scheme. It was lovely to see the smiles on the faces of the people in the film as they touched the animals and the obvious devotion and compassion in the eyes of the animals as they were being handled. A most enjoyable speaker who was thanked by Jenny Bailey.

The competition – A Dog in Any Medium – was won by Patsy with her portrait of Archie followed in second place by Anne with her portrait of Sasha and thirdly by Doreen with a photograph of her sheepdog Megan. A really delicious supper was provided by Ann, Chris and Sharron.

The next meeting for the Ladies Who Lunch will be a return visit to Nico's at

Swaffham on July 29th. Prior to lunch, a tour of the Eco Centre has been arranged and, for those brave enough to do it, a climb to the top of the Windmill!

Our next WI meeting will be held on August 10th when John Everett will tell us "All About BEES" and the competition will be a Honey Recipe.

Mr Everett showed us the construction of the National Hive which is now used nationwide and explained the life cycle and habits of all the bees from the Queen Bee to the drones and workers. We then saw various pieces of honeycomb, and several jars of honey were purchased by members as well as tins of polish and beeswax. It was a very interesting and informative talk and, after answering the many questions posed by members, Mr Everett was thanked by Patsy.

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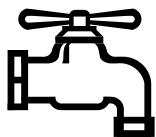

WHAT DOES THE DOCTOR THINK THIS MONTH?

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MINUTES OF NORTHWOLD PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD AT THE VILLAGE HALL TUESDAY JUNE 1ST 2010

1. Apologies for absence

Mr D George, Mr J Norris, Mr M Roberts.

2. No Declarations of Interest were made.

3. The minutes of the meeting held on 04/05/10 were agreed as a true record.

4. No Matters Arising from previous meetings were raised.

5. Reports

5.1 Chairman's Report

The motorist who damaged the fence at the Old Chalk Pit has verbally agreed to make monthly contributions towards the cost of repairing the fence. Miss Muir was thanked for her assistance with this matter. Miss Muir offered to draw up an agreement to be signed relating to the proposed arrangement to pay monthly contributions. It was suggested the tenant of the land should be asked to consider undertaking the repair in exchange for two years free rent.

A further complaint has been received regarding grass cutting in Northwold cemetery. The contractors will be informed but there is an area in the western side of the cemetery that is difficult to cut as it needs clearing of surplus soil from graves. Some discussion took place as to how this problem can be dealt with and this will be an agenda item for the July Parish Council meeting. The cost of hiring a skip to dispose of the surplus soil will be investigated.

It has been queried whether Water Lane at Whittington has been cut by the

grass cutting contractors as on the contract. The contractors will be contacted.

Complaints have been received regarding the condition of the dykes along Common Drove. The dykes near the river are in need of cleaning out and the footpath is being eroded due to inadequate drainage of surface water. There are also problems with drainage at Ingams Lane and Riverside. Enquiries will be made as to who is responsible for maintenance of the dykes.

Pot holes along Pinfold Lane will be reported to Highways.

It has been reported that illegal motorbikes have been seen at the Common.

Clerk's Report

The grass cutting contractors have replaced a flower vase that was damaged at the Cemetery.

5.3 There has been no further update regarding Manor House.

OPEN FORUM

No members of the public present.

6.1 It was decided to leave pruning of trees in the Old Cemetery until later in the year. The Borough Council conservation team will be contacted before any work is undertaken.

6.2 It was agreed that two water meters will be installed at the Playing Field. The water pipes at the Playing Field will need to be located. Mrs S Leet offered to assist with this.

6.3 Discussion took place regarding training for Councillors. The Clerk will investigate whether Norfolk Association of Local Councils could provide training

locally and if so at what cost. Consideration can then be given as to whether expenditure on training should be included in the budget.

6.4 The provision of salt bins for the parish was discussed. This matter will be raised again nearer the winter when consideration will be given as to whether the Parish Council can release the money from the budget to purchase two bins for Whittington Hill and one for Pinfold Lane.

6.5 For safety reasons the play equipment at Whittington Playing Field has been removed. The sign for the Playing Field has become dislodged and this has been reported to Highways.

7. Correspondence

7.1 A letter has been received from Whittington Parochial Church Council requesting financial assistance toward the upkeep of the churchyard in Whittington. This matter will be an agenda item for the July Parish Council meeting.

7.2 E-mail received from Norfolk County Council stating that fly tipping is monitored and the local area around recycling sites now open part time will be included in site inspection regimes.

7.3 The Playing Field Newsletter.

7.4 Donation request from Norfolk Accident Rescue Service.

It was agreed to accept the tenancy agreements as presented and these will be issued to tenants. The vacant Garden Allotment land will be advertised as available to let at £16.00 per year. It was agreed to raise the rent for the Constable's Charity land to £100 per year.

Lease agreement for Northwold Sports & Social Club

Discussion took place regarding the

GARDEN PARTY

Anyone living within 15 miles of Brandon who wishes to travel by train will probably have used or passed through Brandon Station. In recent years a charity known as **Friends of Brandon Station** (FOBS) has been formed with the aim of acquiring a lease from Network Rail in order to preserve the nineteenth century flint building and ultimately find communal use for the building.

With the help of a small group of volunteers (the Friends), a great deal of superficial work has been carried out to make the station one of the most attractive in the region. The murals and flower boxes have already won prestigious awards. The next step requires considerable funding and a GARDEN PARTY for local families is being held at Riverside Lodge, High Street, Brandon on Sunday 12th September from 12noon until 6pm to help bring the existence and aims of FOBS to the attention of the general public.

A host of attractions have been laid on

including the Breckland Brass Band from 1 to 3pm, a Tea Dance in the marquee to the non-stop piano playing of Pip Jepson, Rowing Boat Hire, Model Railway, Tony's Barbecue and Sandra's Cake Stall, Licenced Bar, Teas and Coffee (Toilets on site). REGISTER OF ELECTORS

The annual canvass for the Register of Electors begins at the end of August, when a form and reply paid return envelope will be personally delivered to every property in West Norfolk. Completion and return of the form is both obligatory and important because the Register is used not just for electoral purposes but also by many financial service providers dealing with, for example, mortgages, loans or new accounts. Anyone whose name is not on the Register will not only be unable to vote at the coming Borough/Parish Council Elections but will also be likely to have problems using any service that involves a check of the Register.

The form is intended for the present occupiers of an address. The name of anyone expected to be resident at the address on 15th October and who is already 18, or will reach that age by 30th November 2011, needs to be on the form and the names of anyone no longer at the address crossed out.

Forms received by owners of properties which are either already empty or are expected to be so on 15th October simply need the "Property empty on 15th October" box ticking and returning. This will avoid the issue of reminders.

In the event of any queries when the form arrives, householders can telephone 01553 616773 and any of the electoral staff will be glad to help.

Early return of the form or, better still, confirmation by freephone, internet (if you have a Community Information Point in your village a terminal is available there) or SMS (details on the form) will avoid the need for reminders and help to keep costs down.

RIVER WATCH

The river threaded its way around the edge of Norwich. The busy city was only a mile or so away and yet here the river Yare meandered along and cut through vast fields and meadows. Trees and green ruled with a thick lushness. Life was slow and lazy. Traffic was non-existent and the only noise was the never ending bird song. The sun shone every day - all day long!

This was the picture nearly sixty years ago where a band of boys waded in the river with nets on sticks and jam-jars searching for anything that showed a sign of life. Every snail or insect attracted noisy attention and an actual fish was a miracle to behold. The occasional gudgeon and minnow and bullhead would all verge on the minute but were closely examined and handed from boy to boy. Each day was a new adventure. Anyone could join in and all wore the same home-knitted swimming trunks with the all important white plastic belt. Black plimsolls were ideal for wading in the river but had to be quickly dried out for the next games lesson at school. We all lived near the city centre and biked to the river in a long crocodile. Our bikes were second hand (if not third and fourth hand) and were left in a pile at the top of the steep river bank. There was fun galore and time flew by with abandon. Such days were repeated every weekend and school holidays were never boring. If you went home before tea time your parents would think that something was wrong!

The exploration of the river was a serious business and the passion meant that nets were soon replaced by long garden canes with fixed fishing lines. The all important hooks were begged from a 'real' fisherman who obviously took pity on the group of young lads. The so-called rods were shared by the many and

turns taken. A self-important boy with a borrowed watch would time the proceedings and make certain that fairness ruled. Those waiting a turn were employed to search for worms or likely looking insects to use as bait. The fish caught got bigger as skills and knowledge increased. Roach and perch were soon discovered. The faithful stretch of river was extended as the search for fish increased and then those awaiting a turn would also be required to wade up and downstream looking for deep holes and other likely places that could be home to fish. Every contour of the river bottom was intimately known. Eternal friendships were formed during those long days as every possible minute was spent at the river.

During the ensuing years real rods and reels appeared. Like the bikes these were far from new and would lack any fineness. Any unwanted broken rod would be received as if gold dust, then repaired and any missing bits ignored and used regardless. Such possession showed we had a serious intent and so the eternal bond of the river and fish grew. There was no leader - we were all equals and no one ever fell out. Any visit to the fine city would invariably mean a detour past the fishing tackle shop but no one would dare venture inside as it was the domain of grown-ups. A look in the jam-packed windows and to smell the linseed oil of the nets if the door was open was reward enough.

In time everyone obtained 'proper' fishing equipment and still on our bikes we travelled further afield to the likes of the Costessey Mill and the upper reaches of the river Wensum. The spirit of adventure and the camaraderie continued. We became quite proficient and sometimes literally filled our nets! When the first of the fishing brigade passed his driving test and somehow managed to borrow his dad's car we all went as the car merely made two journeys! So for a while we travelled the length and breadth of Norfolk in our quest for different rivers. That was until the opposite sex was discovered. Then different urges took over. At first a few resisted but in the end everyone gave in and fishing was not quite so important!

For some the attraction of a river and the waterside was so deeply embedded that even today any river, large or small, has a special pull. Alas commercial lakes and tame instant fish have little appeal for me. Without question those days of

long ago were highly impressionable and now I have the river Wissey on my doorstep and for that I am truly grateful!

Mr Macro, Chairman of the Sports & Social Club attended the meeting to discuss the draft agreement between Northwold Parish Council and Northwold Sports & Social Club. Both parties feel the agreement can continue as presented with little amendment. It was decided to alter condition No. 10 of the agreement to read "the water rates for the Pavilion and Recreation Ground shall be paid by users, including the Club." Water meters are to be installed so users can be billed separately water consumption. A break clause will also be added allowing an early end to the agreement. Mr Macro will report these revisions to the Sports and Social Club Trustees.

4. Matters arising from previous meetings

- The grass cutting contractors have been contacted regarding cutting Water Lane, Whittington.
- Norfolk County Council Rights of Way Officer David Mills has been notified regarding the erosion of the foot-path by the river in Common Drove.
- Miss Muir was thanked for assisting with registration of land owned by Northwold Parish Council. The Playing Field at Church Lane, Whittington and Northwold Playing Field are now registered with Land Registry.
- Possible training for Councillors is being looked into. Arrangements may be made with neighbouring Parish Councils to keep costs down.

- Due to financial restraints the Parish Council is no longer able to assist with cutting the grass at Whittington Church. The Clerk has contacted the tenant of the Chalk Pit to enquire whether he would be willing to repair the fence in lieu of two years rent.

5. Reports

5.1 Chairman's Report

- Concern has been raised regarding litter and empty bottles left on the Playing Field. The Clerk will investigate the cost of providing litter bins and future consideration will be given to the possibility of employing a litter picker.
- The Parish Council has been presented with £20.00 from the Bowls Club. Foolhardy circus paid the money to the Club for the use of the facilities at the Bowls Pavilion when they visited the village. The payment will be deducted from the money owed to the Parish Council by the Bowls Club for water charges.
- To encourage hire it was suggested the vacant Garden Allotment should be split into four plots.
- The grass cutting contractors need to be reminded to strim around the play equipment.
- The cost of new nets for the small goal posts at the Playing Field will be investigated.
- It was agreed that the Parish Council would continue to provide prizes for the school Parish Project. The fence opposite the old Post Office is leaning and the hedge needs trimming.

Clerk's Report

- The Clerk has passed all highways matters reported at the previous meeting to the Highway Engineer.
- The tenant of the Constable's Charity land has been informed of the rent increase and will be sent a new tenancy agreement for completion.
- The notice board at Little London is in a poor state of repair.
- Skip hire for removal of chalk in Northwold Cemetery has been quoted at around £180 per lift. The chalk was thought to be left from grave digging but further investigation is needed to establish if this is correct.
